A call for financial support earlier on in the year resulted in an overwhelming response. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and supporters we received enough funds to continue operating for a few months. We can't thank you enough.

An important lesson was learnt as a result of that situation and now we have taken significant steps to ensure that it will not happen again. Records of accounting and forecasting budgets have been perfected upon. Successfully audited accounts show that our charity's financial records have been officially examined from 2014 to the end of December 2017.

Five Step Plan

Their five-step plan of improvements starts with Item 1 simply called 'Organisation'. This item establishes how we operate, obtain our goals for future growth, defines our hierarchy with the school, identifies each job, its function and where it reports to within the organisation and sets out school and disciplinary rules. Working closely with Job, Roko 20's Manager, the preparation of Item 1 has taken many months and involved intensive management communication training, staff consultations, workshops and extensive research.

New disciplinary rules both positive (rewards), and negative (punishment) – but excluding corporal punishment) were devised, discussed and amended with teachers during two workshops which took place before the start of the 2019 school year.

Implementation of Item 1 began at the start of the new school year on 3rd January. So far it has been a huge success.

Preparation of next item 2 will concentrate on pedagogical rules and teaching program, extra-curricular lessons, teaching and examination methods. Items 3 and 4 will deal with Management of Teachers and Staff, define global HR policies and profiles, the assessment process and administrative processes. The final item 5 will deal with the role and interaction of volunteers.

Job

The return of our Manager, Job Thuo Macharia, in May last year, was one of the major highpoints for us.

Job relocated to another region in Kenya during 2017 and for almost a year we struggled to replace him. In fact, he was irreplaceable! His decision to return to Murang'a and to Roko 20 last April ensured stability and lifted the moral of staff, who hold him in high regard.

Job's integrity, hardworking ethic, honesty and dedication to the success of Roko 20 is second to none.



Class 5 and Office Construction

Anticipated funding did not allow for us to build a new classroom for our new Class 5. Instead we made some adjustments to compensate for the new intake of PP1 pupils. We combined our large computer and library classroom into two smaller classes. We also removed an adjoining wall in our Daycare Centre to make one larger class which will now become our library. Unfortunately, due to the lack of demand for daycare we did not reopen the Centre this term.

In addition to the class refurbishment works we built two offices for the Manager and Director. This allowed for our Head Teacher, Admin Assistant and volunteer to have a larger office to work from.



Volunteers

We had 11 volunteers last year who helped improve the standard of education particularly with computer lessons, art, PE, literacy and in Day Care.

A big thanks go to Emilia, Meral, Benny, Vincent, Camille, Maura, Kristina, Maria and Jonny who all did great work at Roko 20. Not forgetting Aila and Jude our current volunteers.



Our pupils are sports mad, particularly for football. Who better to develop their talents than Jonny. Hailing from a small town in Wales, he arrived in Kenya and hit the ground running. He had just completed a grueling 56K sponsored walk prior to his arrival, raising over 700 pounds for Roko 20. Through his contacts working in the

RAF he arranged to have flown over by RAF plane two goal posts, sports equipment, football kit and a large amount of school resources.

Two main highlights of the term included a football match Jonny arranged with a local primary school and a very competitive end of term Sports Day.

So, a big thanks to all present and previous volunteers who are an important asset to Roko 20.

Goat Project

Martha Muthoni is without a doubt our major success story of 2018.

Our very first year of opening back in 2014 we received a visitor called Mike Crowley. We took him on a visit to Martha's



home. He was struck by the tenacity of this elderly grandmother who, in her late 80s, was left to raise 5 small children alone, the youngest of whom was just 2 years old. He offered to buy her a goat.



Five years on Martha has 9 goats, a flock of hens, and a new home, which she funded herself. Martha makes kiondos, the traditional Kenyan handwoven baskets, which we sell in the UK to give her an income.

What Martha has achieved alone and at her age is an inspiration for us all.

One of the conditions of participating in the Goat Project is that the first born female kid is given to Roko 20 so that we may pass it on to another family in need thereby keeping the project going.

The obvious benefit of these links is the improvement in students' knowledge and understanding of each other's cultures.



Big thanks to the teachers and pupils at Mary Immaculate Catholic Primary School who held various Cake Bake sales and raised a magnificent £250. This money went towards purchasing school text books.
